The **International Affairs Institute (IAI)**, with the support of the **EU Non-Proliferation and Disarmament Consortium (EUNPDC)**, organises the annual *Next Generation Workshop* on non-proliferation and disarmament.

Held each fall as a side event of the EUNPD Annual Conference, the workshop brings together nine outstanding early-career scholars and practitioners — selected through a highly competitive process — from around the world. Participants explore key global security challenges, with recent themes including regional perspectives on non-proliferation and disarmament, nuclear proliferation and the future of the NPT regime, and the impact of emerging technologies on arms control.

The workshop offers a unique platform for presenting fresh ideas and policy recommendations, and features active engagement with EU officials and members of the EUNPD Consortium and Network.

## SIX LEADING THINK TANKS



The Foundation for Strategic Research (FRS) was founded in 1998. It is an independent research centre and the leading French think tank on defense and security issues. Its team of experts in a variety of fields contributes to the strategic debate in France and abroad, and provides unique expertise across the board of defense and security studies. In the area of international security, its specific focuses are security doctrines, arms control, proliferation/dissemination issues and challenges, non-proliferation regimes and policies (small arms, conventional weapons, biological and chemical weapons, nuclear weapons, and their delivery systems). The FRS maintains an active presence in the strategic debate through its publications, its website, and the events it regularly organizes. The Peace Research Institute in Frankfurt (PRIF), member of the Leibniz Association, is the largest as well as the oldest peace research institute in Germany. Today, PRIF's arms control division covers chemical, biological, nuclear and radiological weapons, small and light weapons, conventional weapons, drones, autonomous weapons, emerging technologies as well as mines and cluster ammunition.



The International Institute for Strategic Studies (IISS), founded in 1958, is an independent centre for research, information and debate on global security, political risk, and military conflict. It aims to provide, through publications and discussion forums, the best possible analysis on strategic trends, and to facilitate contacts that would lead to the development of better public policy in the fields of military power and international relations and security. Headquartered in London, the IISS has offices in Germany, the US, Singapore and Bahrain. The IISS Strategy, Technology, and Arms Control Program is based in the IISS-Europe office in Berlin and seeks to provide objective analysis of trends in global conflicts, the strategies and technology employed to achieve security policy aims, and how arms control can support achieving these aims.

The Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI) is an independent international institute dedicated to research into conflict, armaments, arms control and disarmament. Established in 1966, SIPRI provides data, analysis and recommendations, based on open sources, to policymakers, researchers, media and the interested public. Located in Stockholm, Sweden, SIPRI offers a unique platform for researchers from different countries to work in close cooperation. The Institute also hosts guest researchers and interns who work on issues related to the SIPRI research programmes. SIPRI maintains contacts with other research centres and individual researchers throughout the world. The Institute cooperates closely with several intergovernmental organizations and entities, including the United Nations, the European Union, the IAEA and the OPCW, and regularly provides support to parliamentary, scientific and government partners.



The International Affairs Institute (IAI) is an independent think tank, founded in 1965 on the initiative of Altiero Spinelli. IAI aims to promote the understanding of international politics and international relations and to contribute to the advancement of European integration and multilateral cooperation through conferences, seminars, publications and training. Through both in-person courses and online resources on nuclear non-proliferation and disarmament, the Center trains diplomats and practitioners working in Vienna and around the world. In addition to reports and occasional papers, VCDNP experts publish succinct reference briefs and explainers on multilateral nuclear governance, organisations and regimes. The VCDNP offers outreach and other programmes to engage young women and the next generation in arms control, non-proliferation and disarmament field.
