OUTLINE

In late 2011, FEPS commissioned a study from the Istituto Affari Internazionali (IAI) entitled "Strengthening Africa-EU Partnership on peace and security: how to engage African sub-regional organisations and civil society." The study aims to examine the state of play of European Union-African Union cooperation in reinforcing African security policies, conflict prevention instruments and crisis management capabilities. It also evaluates the evolution of EU's orientation towards African peace and security after the entry into force of the Lisbon Treaty in an effort to find ways to better coordinate European policies.

The project takes stock of the existing cooperation arrangements between the EU and the AU and assesses how they could be enhanced in the future. Finally, it investigates the possible role of civil society and sub-regional organisations in EU-AU political dialogue and implementation activities, with particular regard to the involvement of these actors in early warning, crisis management and mediation.

This session will open with a presentation of a first draft of the study of the IAI and offer an expert analysis of its findings. The case study of Africa-EU cooperation will be useful and informative for later sessions of "Call to Europe" in offering a concrete example of EU external cooperation and action.

OUTLINE





This session will deal with many of the big philosophical ideas affecting the formation of EU foreign policy. Progressives have often had considerable difficulty in finding agreement, let alone a common approach to major issues such as soft power, humanitarian intervention and models of democratic transition.

European Union **soft power** has not often been given the focus it deserves but it has seen some notable successes. The processes of enlargement and regional cooperation have diminished the Westphalian conception of hard borders and isolationist notions of sovereignty, thus fostering a more peaceful perspective on Europe's place in the world. However, one cannot escape the question of whether soft power has reached its limits.

In this light, progressives, and Europeans in general, still fail to agree on the merits and pitfalls of so-called "humanitarian interventionism". While clusters of individual EU member states have participated in interventions, such as the Kosovo campaign in 1999 or Libya in 2011, there is still little agreement on the effectiveness or desirability of such actions. Division remains on both the moral imperatives and motivations at play in such situations. Furthermore, agreement on common EU coordination, outside the auspices of NATO or a few willing member states, remains a long way off.

Finally, there are differences of opinion on models of **democratic transition**. Numerous present-day EU member states went through the difficult process of emerging from dictatorships prior to their accession. The processes followed in Southern Europe differed from those in Central and Eastern Europe. What are the lessons Europeans can learn from their own experiences? Can these lessons be of help in constructing a common policy with regard to such initiatives as the Endowment for Democracy and the activities of political foundations and other organisations?

OUTLINE

The third session looks at the practical application of the major philosophical themes discussed in the previous workshop. This will involve addressing specific focal points for external action such as the EU Action Plan for the Balkans, the Middle East, Enlargement and the pursuit of shared targets for EU member states. This section of the conference will adopt a comparative focus so as to see how lessons learnt from past action and inaction can affect present day policy making.

The participants involved are asked to talk separately on the matters of the Balkans and the Middle East. As a result, the first half of this session will be dedicated to the Balkan region, with the objective to retrieve lessons from previous experiences. The second half will focus on the Middle East, and whether the lessons from the past could be applicable on the current situation. More specifically, a session of this nature allows us to examine the ramifications of previous experiences in the South Eastern Europe for EU action in North Africa today. The process of enlargement has been beneficial to the quality of life and of democracy in the former Yugoslavia. While such measures cannot be directly applied in the Southern Neighbourhood, this session entails expertise on both regions, knowledge that should be combined in order to take on the current challenges on the EU's doorstep.
