In the aftermath of the popular protests in North Africa, the GCC countries are well-positioned to pursue economic and political cooperation with the new regimes. Europe and the United States are closely following the GCC's renewed dynamism in the Mediterranean region. Understanding the GCC's stances and devising forms of cooperation with it will be of utmost importance in this phase of transition. These themes will be explored in a conference organized in Rome by IAI with the support of the German Marshall Fund of the United States (GMF).
