15:15 Session I: The politico-strategic landscape: internal and external challenges to Euro-Atlantic stability

While the Atlantic Alliance is celebrating its 70th Anniversary, Euro-Atlantic stability is challenged by multiple and multifaceted challenges. On the political level, NATO's cohesion seems to be challenged by the complicated EU-US relationship as well as Brexit and growing nationalist sentiments within Europe. From a politico-military point of view, to the East Russia continues to have an assertive stance challenging the Alliance's defence posture and the liberal international order, while to the South instability continues to fuel local conflicts, to encourage large-scale migration flows, and to inspire terrorist attacks. In addition, rapid technological advancements may pose additional threats to the Euro-Atlantic security and stability, as they affect, for instance, cyber security and the spread of weapons of mass destruction. Participants will discuss the current Euro-Atlantic security situation and explore the possible implications for the future of the Atlantic Alliance.

17:00 Session II: The maritime domain: threats and responses

Phenomena such as globalization, information revolution and eased cross-border movements have affected the concept of maritime security and increased its complexity. For instance, these developments have contributed to turn world's seas and oceans into

increasingly accessible environments for criminal or threatening activities, i.e. human trafficking, traffic of narcotics, weapons smuggling, proliferation of weapons of mass destruction (WMD), as well as piracy and terrorism. At the same time, tensions between Russia and the West have had maritime implications in the Baltic Sea, Black Sea, Mediterranean Sea and Atlantic Ocean. Such a complex scenario requires an integrated approach of greater civil-military and inter-agency cooperation as well as enhanced situational awareness, at both NATO, EU, and national levels. The Participants will focus on the maritime environment by highlighting what are the major challenges to Euro-Atlantic security and explore possible responses in terms of strategies, operations and technologies.

9.15 Session III: European Allies' capability development: Cash, Capabilities and Contribution

Burden sharing is a long-standing debate within the Alliance. Notwithstanding the Allies' commitments to increase their defence spending made at the 2014 Wales Summit and reiterated in Warsaw in 2016, at the 2018 Brussels Summit Trump's strong criticisms have brought this issue back on the top of the agenda in a confrontational way. 11:15 Session IV: Partnerships and partners' capacity building: NATO and EU efforts in the European neighbourhood

Since the 2016 Warsaw Summit NATO has embraced the agenda of Projecting Stability, most notably in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region. In parallel, the EU has developed a long-standing and wide-ranging commitment in the stabilization of these regions, through military and civilian missions, economic assistance, and a number of other tools. In the context of the 2016 and 2018 EU-NATO Joint Declarations, there is much room of improvement of cooperation and synergies between the two organisations towards by and large the same group of partner nations. Participants will address the respective efforts of NATO and EU in projecting Stability or crisis management, review the current process of NATO-EU cooperation, and explore avenues for increased synergies.
