FM: No talks with siege nations at the cost of sovereignty

DOHA: Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister H E Sheikh Mohamed bin Abdulrahman Al Thani reaffirmed that any Thani realfirmed that any dialogue with the siege countries will not be at the expense of the sovereignty of Qatar, stressing the need to have basic principles for any dialogue, with these principles shielded by a clear mechanism to settle conflicts. Speaking yesterday as he laid out the foreign policy of Qatar before the Advisory Council, the minister said that the siege countries have violated all articles of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) Charter, reiterating the importance of having a clear and binding mechanism to settle GCC conflicts.

H E Sheikh Mohamed spoke about the constants of the foreign policy of Qatar, pointing out that it is based on building friendly relations with world countries, protecting the interests of the state, defending Arab and Islamic issues and issues of the vulissues and issues of the vur-nerable, working to establish international peace and security through adherence to interna-tional laws, activating cooper-ation in multilateral frameworks at the United Nations and specialised bodies.

Record decrease in traffic deaths, injuries

DOHA: The average deaths in road traffic incidents in Qatar last year were 5.4 per 100,000 persons, a figure far below than world average of 17.4 per 100,000 persons.

This was announced by the General Directorate of Traffic yesterday in a press conference held at its headquarters about the traffic statistics of 2017 compared to 2016. The traffic statistics 2017 showed remarkable progress regarding reduction in the number of deaths and traffic

Brigadier Ibrahim Saad Al Sulaiti, Head of Statistical Analysis at Office of Interior Minister of Interior said that the most important international indi-cators achieved by Qatar last year, is the reduction in the mor-tality rate due to traffic accidents compared to global averages. The press conference was attended by Brig Ibrahim Saad Al Sulaiti, Head of Statistical Analysis office. Brig Mohammed Saad Al Kharji, DG of General Directorate of Traffic and Brig Muhammad

Smart device to impound cars at home

DOHA: The General Directorate of Traffic has introduced smart device connected to Direcdevice connected to Direc-torate, which is capable of tracking and locating the seized vehicle to ensure the period of custody specified by the traffic. With the introduction of the

new device the motorists in new device the motorists in Qatar will be able to keep impounded vehicles at their own premises instead of leaving it at police-designated impounding yards.

The announcement was made yesterday at the General Directorate of Traffic during a press conference at its head-quarters about the traffic statistics of 2017 compared the

Text messages will be sent to the offender and the device will be installed in the car by specialists. installed in the car by specialists from the Traffic department. achievements were due to enhancement of measures such as traffic awareness, road traffic control, driver qualification, test development, vehicle inspection and quality of ambulance services, which reduced the number of deaths as the ambu-lance response time reduced to 5 to 7 minutes in Doha. Out of 177 died in road acci-

dents in 2017, 45 percent were drivers, 23 percent passengers while 32 percent were pedes-trians. He said the causes of mortality were high speed and reluc tance to fasten seat belts. He said that the department has developed curricula in driving schools, which helped make drivers responsible.



dures taken by the state institutions to enhance safe childhood. It was also aimed at establishing a platform for cooperation between state entities and non-governmental organisations working in that field which would enable the exchange of expertise in order to promote safety for children. The Minister said: "Under the wise leadership of the Emir H H Sheikh Tamin bin Hamad Al Thani, Qatar does not spare any effort in giving importance to children rights, on a legislative and institutional level. The Qatari constitution and other legislations included many provisions that consider family, maternal and children rights," "Oatar sider family, maternal and children rights", "Oatar has attempted to put into practice the basic prin-ciples and provisions of the convention and its pro-tocols to protect and promote the rights of the children

The Minister said importance of enriching cul-ture, consolidating, promoting and protecting childs rights and extracting their creative energy to create a new generation that is able to lead in the future. "This contributes to finding a generation which is able to positively interact with the society and ante to positively interact with the society and adheres to the culture of community which serves the family and particularly children". It is also working on updating the programmes that guarantee all rights, which complies with the Qatar National Vision 2030, which aims to make

Qatar adhering to GDA commitments

DOHA: Qatar is working to fulfil its commitments for supporting the Global Dryland Alliance (GDA), said Minister of Municipality and Environment H E Mohamed bin Abdullah Al Rumaihi.

"The Ministry of Municipality and Environment and other gov-ernment sectors are working to implement Qatar's commitments to GDA within the stipulated time," said the Minister in his inaugural speech at a meeting of the First Ordinary Session of the Executive Board of the Global Drylands Alliance here yesterday. "We met four months ago to sign "We met four months ago to sign the founding agreement of the Global Dryland Alliance in a bid to have an effective framework to unite our efforts to meet the challenges," said the Minister, adding that the first goal is to ensure food security and mitigate the negative impacts of climate change on development in coun-tries in openeral. The tries in general. The

Minister highlighted the concerns of the Emir H H Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al Thani to this international organisa-tion, which was set up upon his initia-tive, adding that His Highness directed to follow-up and sup-port it at all stages. He said that

within the frame-work of the draft agenda of the council, a draft agreement for the Alliance was included that will be in Qatar, so that the organisation can have status of a full-fledged legal body and benefit from the

advantages granted to similar international organisations. "The draft agenda also includes the discussion of the financial resources of the Alliance and the adoption of an innovative and sustainable mechanism that will contribute to the financing of the programme and projects required to be implemented in our countries on priority basis and to enhance the financial resources of the Alli-ance," said the Minister. Ambassador Bader bin Omar

Al Dafa, Executive Director of the Global Dryland Alliance, spoke about the activities of the execu-tive secretariat of the Alliance during the past three months. He added that this period wit-

nessed a number of activities including the implementation of the recommendations of the founding countries of the Alliance, working visits to some member

the Alliance, and the preparation of a paper on the sources of funding of the Alliance.

Al Dafa said that the activities of the Alliance also include the preparation of a proposal for the administrative and organisational structure of its executive secre-tariat, as well as the preparation of a convention to be signed with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the country having its headquar-ters and the expansion of the temporary headquarters.

GDA is an international organisation of dryland countries established with the purpose of achieving food security by sharing knowledge and best practices; assisting in the development of capabilities to prevent food crises. and by providing mutual assist-ance needed at the times of emer-gency such as natural disasters or

On October 15, 2017, Doha hosted the GDA's founding con-ference where the convention of the new international organisa-tion based in Doha was signed.

Following the meeting, the Director General of Kuwait Civil Aviation Eng. Yousef Al Fouzan said the meeting discussed means of cooperation in the fields of air transport, safety systems and exchange of experiences between the two sides to hold joint technical

Al Fouzan explained that the meeting also touched on the possibility of using the Fifth Freedom, which provides for transport exchange rights and the provision of facilities in a manner that achieves flexibility for air carriers between the two countries.

'No talks with siege nations at the cost of sovereignty'

Adherence to international conventions and international development is also the basis of Qatar's foreign policy, in addition to the delivery of Qatari humani-tarian assistance to those affected

tarian assistance to mose affected anywhere in the world. The Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister described the fabricated crisis of the siege as unprecedented in the modern his-tory of Qatar, labelling it as treachery. He said that Qatar, wedgetted, bedoekte of Detar

treacnery. He sault that Quality under the leadership of Emir H H Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al Thani, took a strategic decision to deal with the siege in a civilised and legal way, and to rise above the level of the siege countries in the way they treat the Qatari people.

He also reviewed the stages of

the crisis since its beginning and the measures the state took to counter the siege under directives of the Emir, pointing out that there are no actual reasons for the crisis but it aims to place Qatar under the guardianship of these couns, and direct Doha's internal and external policy and exploits its resources to serve the interests of these countries. Sheikh Mohamed hailed the

great role of Emir of the fraternal tate of Kuwait H H Sheikh Sabah Al Ahmad Al Jaber Al Sabah and his good endeavours to resolve the crisis, noting that has welcomed and supported this role. He also pointed to the role of the different ministries and government entities at the political, economic and legal levels to address the repercussions of the siege.

Asked about Qatar's member-ship in the GCC, H E Sheikh Mohamed said that Qatar does not intend to leave GCC and will con-tinue to work through it as long as the body remains. "If the siege countries want to go and found another entity, let them do." He said that Qatar is now strength-ening its cooperation with Asian

countries and is considering cooperation in the framework of multilateral regional organisations to join and benefit from them

The State of Qatar speaks with the different world countries in the language of interests rather than threats as the siege countries do the deputy prime minister and for the deputy prime minister and tor-eign minister said, adding that Doha has achieved many objec-tives in this regard as major coun-tries condemned the siege and demanded its lifting. On the latest developments in

the crisis, he warned that the siege countries are keen to normalise the crisis and continue it in an attempt to weaken the Qatari economy in the hope that Doha would make concessions, stressing that Qatar has thwarted all these attempts to harm the economy. "The last of these attempts was pressuring the Qatari currency and

Sheikh Mohamed said that the directives of the Emir are to move forward without closing the door to dialogue, stressing that the State of Qatar will pursue its rights to obtain them if the siege countries want to normalize the siege. The Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister stressed that

the social and humanitarian ele ment is what drives the State of Qatar to consider solutions to this crisis. The rest of the situation is stable, he said, warning that the siege countries went far and hoped that Qatar will collapse and have a new political regime, expressing regret for this unjustifiable hostility.

tility.
In response to a question on when the crisis would see a break-through, he stressed that the State of Qatar has moved on from the issue of the siege but at the same time the door remains open to dia-logue in accordance with clear and transparent principles that respect international law and the sover-eignty of the state. Sheikh Mohamed added that Qatar, over

eight months, sought dialogue but the siege countries closed the door, noting that there are no endeav-ours on Qatar's side now in this regard but it welcomes any constructive efforts.

There are no new efforts now except from the United States, especially those related to the Camp David summit, he said, noting that no one was invited to the summit yet, and if the invita-tion was sent, the State of Qatar will attend, adding that the US is in touch with Doha regarding pro-posals to resolve the crisis. In a related context, he reiter-

ated that there are no positive indicators from the siege countries, but rather they move from an escalation to another and prepare new waves of future

As for participation in the upcoming Arab summit, he said that Qatar will attend the summit regardless of its place, and if the host state is one of the siege counnost state is one of the siege countries and does not provide the nec-essary measures, that country will be the violating state and not the State of Qatar.

The Deputy Prime Minister

and Foreign Minister said that the State of Oatar continues to convey the correct picture regarding the siege crisis and its consequences.

adding that thanks to the wise olicy of HH the Emir, the State of Qatar has overcome many of the negative aspects of the crisis and all countries that work with Qatar are convinced that what is happening is a slander against the

state and unjust measures.
Sheikh Mohamed noted that
Doha understands that these countries can not show a strong supportive position due to the bal-ance of interests with the siege countries and the pressures exer

cised on them.

Speaking before the Advisory
Council, he touched on the positions of the State of Qatar on regional and international issues, particularly the Palestinian issue, the Syrian crisis, the war in Yemen, the situation in Libya and the relationship with Iran.

He reiterated the State of Qatar's firm position on the Pal-estinian issue and its support for a just solution according to the Arab Peace Initiative, which guar antees the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people to establish their independent state with Jeru-salem as its capital, as well as sup-porting all the segments of the Palestinian people and the Palestinian reconciliation efforts.

With regard to the Syrian crisis, he reiterated the position of

the State of Qatar calling for a political solution to the crisis and its stand with the Syrian people. its stand with the Syrian people. He said in this regard that the State of Qatar had no motives to change the Syrian regime and tried and sought to have a solution to the crisis at the beginning, but there was no response.

When the regime started using violence against the people, Qatar stood by the Syrian people, he said, adding that Qatar continues to support the Syrian people by providing humanitarian and political support to reach a political solu-tion in accordance with interna-tional decisions and the Geneva 1 resolutions in particular. On the Yemen crisis, he

expressed his belief that it has begun to take a controversial framework because of the contin-uation of the war. He added that Qatar's participation in the Coali Qatar's participation in the coali-tion to Support Legitimacy was based on the conviction that what happened was a coup against legitimacy and should not be accepted. He stressed that Qatar's participation in the coalition was based on its duty and commitment to the collective security of the GCC countries. Sheikh Mohamed added that

Qatar sent its troops to the Saudi border to protect the kingdom and

did not participate in the war in Yemen.

The Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister pointed out that the war continues until today and the Yemeni people suffer from difficult humanitarian conditions, noting that there are 20 million Yemenis below the poverty threshold as well as the spread of diseases and epidemics that kill thousands, while no political solu-

tion looms so far.

For Libya, he said that the
State of Qatar supported the Skhirat Agreement and committed to this support although there are other countries that support par-ties outside international legitimacy. On the Qatari-Iranian relations, he said the relationship between the two countries should be based on clear bases due to geographical proximity and par-ticipation in the largest gas field which requires constant commu-nication between the two sides.

He added in this regard that the State of Qatar and Iran have many points of disagreement on foreign policy, and Qatar still disagrees with Iran on them despite the latter's stand with Doha after the siege.

In response to a question on the US-Qatari strategic dialogue, he explained that this dialogue came in accordance with the directives of the Emir to establish a strategic platform to frame the Qatari-American relations according to a clear and coordi-nated mechanism that brings together all the political, economic defence and energy sectors. He added that there have been fruitful meetings with US counterparts, which produced positive results.

In response to another ques-tion, he said the US will abide by tion, ne said the US Will abide by the declaration of joint defense between the two countries to pro-vide all kinds of support to the State of Qatar in the event of any external attack and this agreement has been in place for years but was highlighted after the strategic

dialogue.

He noted that this is a message from the US to the siege countries that Washington does not stand by their side and that it will seek to resolve the crisis and will not allow the escalation of the dispute out of concern about its interests in the Gulf region.

As for renovating homes of the poor, Al Emadi said that \$1 million was allocated for that purpose, while another \$1 mil-lion will be used to pay the fees of university students. Finally, \$2m will be allocated for humanitarian and morbidity

Seek medical care if travel-related illnesses persist: Expert

DOHA: Hamad Medical Corpo-DOHA: Hamad Medical Corporation's (HMC) has urged residents who are experiencing signs of illness after travelling outside the country to seek medical attention, particularly if they've agreneu to a developing country or region known for mosquito-borne illnesses such as Malaria, Dengue, West Nile Virus, and Zika.

Dr Mohamed Abu Khattab Consultant specialising in Com-municable Diseases and Travel Medicine at HMC, says although most travellers who become sick

will experience only mild illness, it is important for residents to be vigilant and to monitor their health. He says that while most infections will result in symp toms within two to six weeks of travel, incubation periods vary and some conditions can present months to years after initial infection

Anyone who has travelled outside the country and is expe-riencing persistent symptoms, specifically fever (high temperature) or diarrhoea, should immediately consult their doctor or visit the Travel Clinic at HMC's

or another health center that provides travel

"Persistent fever can be a symptom of serious disease. Any resident who has travelled abroad and is experiencing symptoms of illness or is generally feeling unwell should seek medical advice, particularly if they have not taken precautions before travelling to countries that have reported cases of Malaria have reported cases of malaria, Dengue, West Nile Virus, and Zika," said Dr Abu Khattab. "Other symptoms that should not be ignored include

abdominal pain, cough or shortness of breath, and loss of appetite. It is important for travelers to be educated about their risk of contracting dis eases and medical conditions such as Typhoid Fever, Hepa-titis A, Hepatitis B, and intestinal parasites. These conditions can be serious and require medical intervention," added Dr Abu Khattab. An initial diagnosis for most travel-related illnesses can be

quickly made if the patient is able to provide specific details regarding the destination traveled to and the potential risk factors he or she has been exposed to.

Dr Abu Khattab says it is

important not to ignore per-sistent symptoms of illness and when seeking medical attention to inform the treating doctor of any recent travel. To book an appointment at HMC's Travel Clinic, call 4025 4003.

44 dead in regime strike in Syria's rebel enclave

HAMMURIYEH, SYRIA: Heavy Syrian bombardment killed 44 civilians in rebel-held Eastern Ghouta yesterday, as regime forces appeared to prepare for an imminent ground assault.

The escalation came as pro government forces were expected to enter the northern Kurdishcontrolled enclave of Afrin, to take a stand against a month-old Turkish assault there. Held by rebels since 2012,

Eastern Ghouta is the last opposition pocket around Damascus and Syrian President Bashar al-Assad has dispatched reinforcements there in an apparent bid to retake it. A barrage of air strikes, rocket fire, and artillery slammed into several towns across Eastern Ghouta yesterday, killing 44 civil-ians and wounding dozens more. Syrian government air strikes and artillery killed 71 people in the eastern Ghouta pocket near Damascus over the past 24 hours, the **Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human** Rights said.

The Britain-based Syrian Observ atory for Human Rights said 20 were killed in air strikes on Hammuriveh and nine others in hom-

bardment on Saqba.

The rest were killed when other areas were pounded. Four children were among the dead.

Ankara municipal Ankara municipal workers put up the new sign in Turkish for Olive Branch Street, replacing the one named after late Ankara gov-ernor Nevzat Tandogan.

Turkey launched Operation Olive Branch last i to drive a Syrian Kurdish militia out of northwest Syria. The militia group is a major US ally in fighting the Islamic State group. Turkey regards them as terrorists. When asked last week about the upcoming name change, US State Department spokeswoman Heather Nauert said that "they can call it what ever they want. 


The crash of the aircraft, brought back into service only months ago after being grounded for seven years, was yet another fatal aviation disaster for Iran, which for years was barred from buying necessary airplane parts due to Western sanctions over its contested nuclear

Press TV said search teams reached the crash site before dawn yesterday. The station said the weather had improved, though it was still windy. The semi-official Tasnim news agency cited the mil-itary as saying Russia had helped locate the crash site. Russia and Iran are close military allies. The TV broadcast footage of a heli-

copter joining the search and showed ambulances and rescue vehicles pre-paring to reach the site on Mount Dena which is about 4,400 metres (14,400 feet) tall. The site is reportedly at a height of 3,500 metres (11,500 feet).

State radio said five helicopters and five drones are active in the search operation. Iran's semi-offi-cial ISNA news agency said that more than 150 climbers have joined the





South Sudan rebels release Kenvan pilots after compensation paid

JUBA: South Sudanese rebels have released two Kenyan pilots they were holding after receiving compensation for the family of a civilian killed when their plane crashed tor the tamily of a civilian killed when their plane crashed last month, a rebel spokesman said. The plane came down in Akobo, in the Greater Upper Nile region in early January, and the rebels asked for compensation for the family of a woman who was killed, and for others who lost live-stock. Lam Paul Gabriel, deeputy spokesman of the rebel SPLA-IO said that \$107,700 had been paid.

Govt steps up action against Zuma-linked family

JOHANNESBURG: South African authorities are escalating an anti-corruption drive against a business family linked to former president Jacob Zuma, saying they could seek Interpol's help to track suspects believed to be out of the country. Police Minister Fikile Mbalula said in an interview with state broadcaster SABC that the search for several suspects, including a member of the Gupta family, is focusing on India, China or Dubai, One of the missing is roctasting or initial, China of Bubai. One of the initial initiality suspects is India-born Ajay Gupta, accused along with his brothers of using connections to Zuma to manipulate state companies for their own financial benefit.

Syria's future: A frozen conflict



N January 30, the Sochi talks on Syria's political future came to a frustrating conclusion. Even though Russian policymakers were initially optimistic that the Sochi framework would promote dialogue between Syrian President Bashar Al Assad's supporters and Syrian opposition factions, both the Sunni opposition and the Kurdish nationalist forces boycotted the talks.

As the Sochi talks broke down just weeks after both the Geneva and Astana processes failed to ease tensions between the conflicting parties in Syria, prospects for the swift implementation of a Syrian peace settlement appear of a syrian peace settlement appear remote. This grim assessment is substantiated by the unwillingness of both pro-Assad and pro-opposition factions to accept a military de-escalation, and the plethora of competing interests within these coalitions that hinder the development

of a viable peace deal.

Although the formal establishment of de-escalation zones in Syria in September 2017 gained broad international support, actors on both sides of the conflict have violated these agreements to combat perceived

agreements to combat perceived security threats. In recent weeks, Russia and Iran have intensified their attacks on opposition targets in Idlib, and have istified these military activities by claiming that a genuine de-escalation of the Syrian conflict can only be achieved once Jabhat Al Nusra is vanquished. Some Kurdish factions, like the

Democratic Union Party (PYD) and People's Protection Unit (YPG) militias have hindered international efforts to

attempted to preserve their remaining territorial holdings through the use of military force. Even if both pro-Assad and pro-

Even if both pro-Assad and pro-opposition factions eventually conclude that their goals cannot be achieved through military force alone and agree to a cease-fire, competing interests within these features all likely trains the factions will likely stymie the

ractions will likely styrine the implementation of a workable Syrian peace settlement. Within the pro-Assad bloc, Russian and Iranian policymakers disagree on what Syria's post-civil war political system should look like. Russia wants to establish a federal system that recognises Assad's control over Syria's largest cities, while giving Kurdish nationalists and selected Sunni opposition factions autonomy over their zones of influence. The Iranian zones of influence. The Iranian government opposes this compromise as Tehran rejects the legitimacy of any political settlement that does not recognize Assad's control over the entirety of Syria.

Amongst anti-Assad actors, there are similar disagreements on the ideal power balance within a reconstructed Syrian state. Even though the United States has periodically acquiesced to Assad playing a role in the peace process, Washington views Assad as an Iranian proxy and will likely continue to



undertake military actions to prevent Assad from recapturing additi

Syrian territory. Turkey shares Washington's perspective on Assad's illegitimacy, but opposes US military support for Kurdish factions and the creation of an autonomous Kurdish enclave in

The implausibility of a peace settlement that sufficiently accommodates the competing interests of all major stakeholders in the Syrian conflict ensures that the most likely long-term outcome in Syria is the establishment of a frozen conflict.

This scenario would give Assad political hegemony over the majority of Syrian territory, and convert the Syrian civil war into a lower-intensity Syrian civil war into a lower-intensity conflict with more sporadic violence. Yet Assad's actual political power would be limited, as he would have to constantly defend his authority against Sunni insurgents that aim to against Sunni insurgents that aim to weaken his hold on power and Kurdish nationalists seeking to secede from a fragile Syrian state. The establishment of a frozen conflict in Syria will influence the

coninct in Syria will influence the Middle East geopolitical environment in three main ways. First, Russia will emerge as the chief guarantor of the Syrian state's stability and unity. A frozen conflict scenario would safeguard Russia's naval base in Tartus and air base in khmeimim, giving Moscow considerable military resources to project power in Syria. If popular unrest were to break

out in Syria, Russia would likely out in Syria, Russia would likely utilise its military presence to strengthen Assad's position, while using diplomacy to prevent the re-escalation of the Syrian conflict into a full-blown civil war. Moscow has been able to maintain this delicate has been able to maintain this deficate
balance in other frozen conflict zones

like Nagorno-Karabakh and
Eastern Ukraine — and it is wellequipped to achieve a similar outcome in Syria.

outcome in Syria.
Second, a frozen conflict is likely
to make Syria a proxy in the Saudi
Arabia-Iran struggle for regional
dominance. As Riyadh remains
staunchly opposed to Assad's
retention of power. Saudi Arabia could
provide financial support for Sunni
opposition factions in Syria who reject
Assad's legitimacy and disdain Iran's
hegemony over Syria's political
system.

These hardline opposition factions could use Saudi financial support to instigate an insurgency in the regions held by the Assad regime.

Many of them were focused on measures that differentiate between distinct migratory between distinct migratory waves, with the purpose of "divert[ingl migration rather than attempting to stop it". Others investigated the costs and benefits of "outsourcing" migration control, the Furopean Union's strategy for 'Sahel Security'', and the 'financial" cost of the 'migration crisis" for European

No less attention was given to the "lucrative business" of NGOs in relation to migratory waves, to the role of organised crime in the "smuggling of migrants" to Europe, and, last but not least, to the importance of "showing solidarity towards these desperate people". But none of these claims or

efforts, nor the related policies

carried out by European countries in the region, offer long-term solutions to, and deep understanding of, the key ctural conditio ise of the ongoing migratory waves. These short-term policies and analyses speak to the "gut" of European public opinion but fail to provide structural answers to present and future generations. The acronym OPL 245

means little, if anything, to most people. Yet, it is the name of the deal for the acquisition of the largest oil block (over 9 billion barrels of crude) in Africa. It is situated off the coast of Nigeria, from where of Nigeria, from where, historically speaking, 12 million slaves were exported to European colonies in the Americas beginning in the 15th century. It is the most populous country in the continent and the one from which the largest number of migrants have arrived by sea to Italy in 2016. The \$1.1bn invested by

European oil and gas nies in the acquisition of companies in the acquisition of this oil block would have covered over 80 percent of Nigeria's entire health budget for 2015. The ordinary citizens of Nigeria did not see a penny from the deal. The acquisition, finalised through blackmail, benefitted only a very limited number of corrupt officials and OPL 245 is hardly an exceptional case. Indeed, the natural resources (fuel, gold, gas etc) of most, if not all African countries and a number of the states in the Eastern Mediterranean are still being syphoned off through offshore companies that, to a large extent, are linked to European and American companies and businessmen. As the Panama Papers confirmed, anonymous companies (about 1400) and tax havens are used to exploit the natural wealth of some of

the world's poorest countries.
Only by opening Europe to
African products beyond raw African products beyond raw materials — while guaranteeing an equal share of the benefits to African populations — and addressing the structural conditions that undermine the development consciit of development capacity of millions of people, will the EU be able to implement a vision based on sustainable solutions Some of the countries are

among the major recipients of the almost \$1.5bn in rifles, rocket launchers, heavy machine guns, mortar shells and anti-tank weapons currently exported from Europe (largely via the Balkans) to the Middle East: some of these arms are currently being in used in Syria and Yemen, contributing to the destabilisation of the region as a whole

And "destabilisation" is indeed another key aspect to be considered when addressing the structural conditions that are fostering "migration and the trafficking of people". It is a story as old as the world: People tend to migrate when they feel unsafe or unable to fulfil their needs. In this context, it is needs. It into tomest, it is enough to mention that, according to data provided by the US State Department, "incidents of terrorism" increased by 6500 percent (199 attacks in 2002, 13,500 in 2014) since George W Bush started the so-called "war on terror" in

How will migration affect Africa and Europe in the

to a large extent bound to demographics. The total population of Africa will grow from the current 1.2 billion to 2.5 billion by 2050, while some European countries will see their populations decline or stay relatively stagnant over the same period. For example, the EU predicts Italy's population to decline from nearly 61 million to under 59 million by 2050.

This further explains why tackling migration and the trafficking of people by deploying troops or diverting human flows is a red herring Only structural solutions will enable the EU and other international players to turn the challenges that these numbers bring with them into opportunities. From the perspective of the EU, these structural solutions include five

main policies:
1. Exposing and sanctioni: Exposing and sanctionithe ongoing exploitation of Africa's natural resources by private and public European companies in order to tackle some of the structural causes migration — those hindering the development of many. the development of many countries in the region.

 Overcoming the self-serving cliche of "investing in African countries", while opening Europe — including by involving multinational involving multinational corporations — to African products and enabling local populations to sustain their economies.

3. Monitoring and

stemming the flow of weapons produced in European countries and sold in African and Middle Eastern countries affected by wars (Yemen first and forement) and foremost).

4. Providing legal protection and opportunities – possibly using some of the 6bn euros (\$7.5bn) allocated by the EU to strengthen Europe's external borders - for "climate migrants", that is those (millions of people) who flee African countries because of theeffects of climate change.

This includes rejecting the policy of nis includes rejecting the polic "outsourcing" migration management, a short-term "solution" that has created an economic boom in a number of centres, some located in desert areas, becoming an industry that

profits off the most vulnerable.

It could be claimed that none of these policies is realistic, or fully feasible. If so, it is necessary to at least deconstruct the common image of a generous Europe committed to finding humanitarian solutions to "millions of migrants", and that has to cope with the consequences of

"others' problems". Indeed, too often we tend to approach the dramatic present of many Middle Eastern and African countries as something that pertains to peoples and contexts that are largely detached from our political, largety detached from our pointcal, historical and economic past and present. This mindset is often part of an ongoing medievalisation of these regions, that is, the tendency to juxtapose an allegedly "medieval" Middle East and Africa with a modern, secular, normative West

It is necessary to overcome this segregated interpretation of "our history" and "their history", paving the way for a more humble approach towards the peoples region and their sufferance

This new attitude will help to reshape the paradigmatic schemes through which to look at the "European Neighbourhood" and to realise Eric Hobsbawm's wish to rescue not only "the stockinger and the peasant, but also the nobleman and the king".

Figuring out how to flight back, in a
free society of open communication, is
the most urgent national security
challenge we face. Friday's indictments
by special counsel Robert Mueller III of a by special counsel Robert Mueller III of a Russian trolling operation is a welcome sign that we are joining the battle. But so far, we are losing. And should we fail, the future will belong to authoritarian states that protect their virtual borders by controlling Internet access.

In his paper, "Commanding the Trend: Social Media as Information Warfare," Lt. Col. Jarred Prier exam strategies and tactics used by both the Islamic State and the Russian government to seize command of trending topics on Twitter and, to a lesser degree, Facebook. By hijacking these algorithms, enemy agents and their armies of bots inflame tension and erode trust across American society

A striking example, which Prier documents in detail, came during the November 2015 protests at the University

of Missouri. A dispute over benefits for graduate teaching assistants had escalated into broad allegations of racism on campus. Spotting the trending hashtag *PrayforMizzou, a Russia-linked Twitter *PrayforMizzou, a Russia-linked Twitter account, @Fanfan1911, tweeted a photo of a bruised African-American youth that was lifted from an unrelated story. "The cops are marching with the KKK" the tweet declared. "They beat up my little brother! Watch out!" This untrue message, signed "Jermaine," was retweeted hundreds of times by Russian bots — enough to unleash it is as a viral. bots - enough to unleash it as a viral contagion among duped Americans, including Missouri's student body

including Missouri's student body president. As other accounts in the orbit of @ Fanfan1911 added fake details, Jermaine demanded the news media cover the nonexistent Klan rampage. Twitter-obsessed reporters ran in search of a story. Though the facts eventually came limping onto the scene, lasting damage was done. Morale and enrollment sagged at the university. Trust in media and at the university. Trust in media and police took another hit. The reputation and economy of Missouri absorbed a

blow.

Not bad for a single shift at the disinformation factory. In each incarnation, the agent employs the same tools: distorted or fabricated narratives, legions of retweeting bots, existing networks of unsuspecting partisans ready to believe the worst, allegations of elite corruption, and the viral engine of

trending hashtags.
Director of National Intelligence Daniel Coats reported to Congress this last week that such efforts are designed "to exacerbate social and political fissures in the United States," "to create insures in the Omied states, to create wedges that reduce trust and confidence in democratic processes," and "to encourage anti-US political views."

It's working. That's why this

challenge is critical to our national security. We cannot tackle either threats or competition from China, North Korea, Russiaor violent Islamist extremists without a common sense of purpose at home and supportive allies abroad. Prier wraps up his paper by calling on social media companies, political leaders and journalists to come to the aid of the country. Twitter, he notes, faces a of the country. Iwitter, he notes, taces a particular quandary because bot networks and the trending-topic feature – two key weapons in the enemy's arsenal – are both integral to the company's business model. Advertisers love Twitter bots, while the trending algorithm lends an air of urgency and authority that the platform would otherwise lack. On the other hand, I see no good

work curbing our "overreliance on social media for breaking news," as Prier puts it. Reporters should treat every tweet with skepticism and demand real-world confirmation of tweeted "news" before sharing it. The first engagement of the Trudeau family, dressed in shades of festive yellow and red, was a visit to the Sabarmati Ashram. After paying tributes to Mahatma Gandhi, the Canadian Prime Minister tried his hand at the spinning wheel.

Trudeau appeared at ease as though
on a family tour instead of an official visit
and sported an attractive red bandhgala
kurta accompanied by a cream-coloured
churidar and even a matching stole.

Similarly, his wife Sophie Gregoire Trudeau was in a bright yellow long kurta which she teamed with white palazzo pants. She wore drop-down earrings, gold bangles and a little bindi to give her a completely traditional Indian look

Writing in the visitor's book at the Sabarmati Asrham, Trudeau said: "A beautiful place of peace, humanity and truth that is as needed today as ever." He then

"When you think of natural connections between India and Canada, espe-cially in field of agriculture or pulses, where we have slight challenges. We are discussing potential of growth in pulses." Referring to the issue of immigration, especially in context of most of the countries globally looking inwards and raising barriers, Trudeau said that he and Canada firmly believed that the new reality for 21st century is going to be heterogeneous societies

"India has done fairly well and Canada too has done fairly well to see that differ-ences can become source of strength and not weakness. As you get more pluralistic, nguage, religion, ethnicity, ideology should be anchored in shared values that society subscribes to." Trudeau went on to say that dividing society on the basis of ethnicity and religious lines was a "tribal" approach to civilisation that has over thousands of years ripped apart these beliefs.

"There are two paths - you can either amplify the anxiety in the world by blaming a particular ethnic or religious group for all the troubles in the society or you can take a more successful pluralistic approach, when you actually meet people with different story and believe that we meet them and grow." The Canadian Prime Minister also had a word for the media, which he called "frustrating" at times but in the same breath said that it times but in the same breath said that it was important to support it as it rells the governments where it is wrong. "Independent media is essential for a successful democracy." Trudeau again summoned the name of Mahatma Gandhi to be his inspiration, "He should be an inspirat to all. Idea of extraordinary strength in compassion, peace and non-violence."

PNB fraud points to 'supervisory failure at central bank'

MUMBAI: India's government has said the \$1.77bn fraud at state-run Punjab National Bank was a manifestation of supervisory failure' at the country's central bank, local media

reported yesterday.

In a letter to the Reserve Bank
of India (RBI), the government
said the failure to detect the fraud, the biggest ever in India's banking the biggest ever in India's banking sector, raised questions about the central bank's 'efficacy of super-vision to detect and check sys-temic failure', NewsRise and other local media reported.

"Either the framework designed by RBI to prevent and detect such frauds is inadequate or RBI is unable to ensure its effective implementation," they quoted the letter as saying. The RBI did not immediately respond to a request for comment yesterday, which was a holiday in Mumbai. A finance ministry spokesman declined comment.

Rajeev Kumar, the top gov ernment bureaucrat over ernment bureaucrat overseeing banks, said in New Delhi the finance ministry had written to the country's banks to take effec-tive steps to avoid a repeat of a PNB-like fraud. Kumar declined to comment if the government had written to the RBI.

The government action comes as federal police briefly locked down the PNB branch in south Mumbai that was at the heart of the scam and continued searches yesterday to gather evi-dence. The bank would have been closed yesterday anyway because of the holiday. A source at the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) said the branch was likely

Resides searching the premises, the police also questioned more PNB officials on yesterday, the CBI source said, taking the total number bank staff who

have been questioned so far to 13.

Three people, including two
employees of PNB, India's second largest state-run lender, were largest state-run lender, were arrested and presented before a Mumbai court over the weekend in the case that involves billion-aire jeweller Nirav Modi. Police also questioned some

executives from Nirav Modi's group, the source said

The bank has said that the two employees arrested by police colluded with companies

belonging to Modi and another jeweller Mehul Choksi, who heads jewellery retailer Gitanjali Gems Ltd and other companies. Jeweller Modi, whose clients include Hollywood stars such as

Kate Winslet and Dakota Johnson, has not commented on the alle gations. Police have said Modi and his family left India before PNB filed a complaint on the alleged fraud.

Choksi has also not con

choksi nas also not com-mented, and police have said he also left India last month. PNB has said the two bank officials issued fraudulent letters of undertaking to overseas branches of other Indian banks which lent money to the iewellers based on the guarantee from PNB. All the letters of under-taking were issued by the two employees who were working at the Brady Road branch in south Mumbai

PNB shares slid for a fourth straight day yesterday, closing 7.2 percent lower. The sell off has wiped out about \$1.7bn, or more than a quarter of the bank's market value, since it disclosed

the fraud last Wednesday.

Meanwhile in a sign of the
widening fallout from the PNB case, shares of Choksi's Gitanjali Gems fell 9.9 percent after its chief financial officer and com-pany secretary resigned yesterday. In a letter shared with stock

exchanges, Company Secretary Pankhuri Warange said she was resigning because of the compa-ny's lack of disclosure despite her advice to be forthcoming.

However, sev-eral officials contacted in neighbouring Myanmar said they were not aware of plans for a meeting, which Kalam said would take place on the 'zero line' near a place called

Gundum. A spokeswoman for the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), which will not be involved in the talks, said the agency was concerned the Rohingya may be forcibly returned to Myanmar without due consideration for their safety

Nearly 700,000 Rohingya have fled Myanmar's Rakhine state and crossed into Bangla-desh since last August, when attacks on security posts by insurgents triggered a military crackdown that the United Nations has said amounts to ethnic cleansing, with reports of arson attacks, murder and

Maldives leader seeks nod to extend emergency

MANILA: Philippine police and army troops have arrested an Arab man they believe was a former commander of the Islamic State group along the Syria and Turkey border in a raid on a Manila apart-ment, where they found bomb-making materials and an IS-style flag, the national

materiais and an IS-style Itag, the national police chief said yesterday. Police Director General Ronald dela Rosa said Fehmi Lassoued, who is report-edly from Egypt, and his Filipina com-panion, Anabel Moncera Salipada, were arrested last week based on intelligence

provided by foreign counterparts.

He said investigators were looking into possible links between the two suspects and local and foreign militant groups, and whether they were involved in any terrorist activity. Dela Rosa said at a news conference that Lassoued has a fake Tuni-sian passport and may be a militant recruiter, but did not offer any evidence.

Clad in an orange detainee shirt, hand-cuffed and held on both sides by soldiers,

Lassoued stood with his head often bowed in front of a table where bomb-making parts and other evidence were displayed at the news conference.

Salipada is from the southern town of Upi in Maguindanao province, where Muslim militants operate, according to her identity card. Lassoued apparently entered the Philippines in July 2016 from Iran using the Philippines in July 2016 from Iran using a fake passport which Philippine immi-gration personnel failed to detect, dela Rosa sald, adding that he traveled to Kuala Lumpur in Malaysia and the Turkish city of Istanbul from 2016 to 2017.

Investigators were also trying to deter-Investigators were also trying to deter-mine if Lassoued was involved in a siege by hundreds of Islamic State group-aligned militants on the southern Islamic city of Marawi last year, dela Rosa said. The five-month uprising left more than 1.100 combatants dead, mostly Muslim I,IOO combatants dead, mostly Muslim militants, and displaced hundreds of thou-sands of villagers before troops crushed it with ground assaults and airstrikes. The Marawi siege, which was joined by several Indonesian, Malaysian and Arab

militants, reinforced fears that the Islamic State group was gaining a foothold in

Southeast Asia following battle setbacks in Syria and Iraq.

Two-thirds of Australians want deputy PM to resign

SYDNEY: Two-thirds of Australian voters want Deputy Prime Minister Barnaby Joyce to resign following his extramarital affair with his former press secretary, a poll showed yesterday, adding pressure on a government already fractured by the scandal.

Joyce, a Catholic who cam paigned on 'family values' and who has been married for 24 years, refused to resign when it was made public he was expecting a child with his former Some 65 percent of voters

want Joyce to step down as leader of the rural-based National Party, the junior partner in the government led by the Liberal Party, The Australian news paper's Newspoll showed.

The Liberal-National coali tion has existed since 1923, with the National leader usually taking on the deputy prime

ministership. The scandal has damaged the government's reelection chances, according to election chances, according to Newspoll. The government, which has only a one-seat majority, now trails the main opposition Labour Party by a margin of 53-47 percent on a two-party basis.

The government must call an election by May 2019.
With mounting public pressure, Joyce sought to turn the tide of public opinion, giving a rare interview yesterday with the Sydney Morning Herald news-paper, where he blamed public life for the breakdown of his

marriage. Joyce has began a highly unusual week-long leave of absence at the urging of Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull, who will this week travel to Washington, which would have typi-cally seen Joyce installed as acting prime minister. Finance Minister Mathias Cormann will now be acting leader.

Afghan political crisis deepens as second governor refuses to resign

KABUL: A governor in northern Afghanistan has become the second in the region to defy an order by President Ashraf Ghani to step down, deepening a polit-ical crisis facing the US-backed

government in Kabul.

Abdul Karim Khadam, the governor of northern Samangan province, was sacked along with four other provincial governors last week

But he followed Atta Mohammad Noor, the heavy-weight governor of neigh-bouring Balkh province, who refused to leave office after he

was also sacked in December.
Noor's refusal to step dowr
has turned the so-called 'King
of the North' into one of Afghanistan's most infamous politicians and a potential contender in presidential elections due in 2019, while underscoring the weakness of Ghani's government. Khadam's decision to follow suit has deepened the crisis and threatened to further ethnic divisions between Tajiks and the Pashtun-dominated south, which often dominate

Afghanistan's politics.
An ethnic Turkmen, Khadam belongs to the Tajik-dominated Jamiat-e-Islami party, of which Noor is also a member. "The decision is unfair and

unjust. It is against the principles. I condemn this decision and don't accept it. I will wait for Jamiat party stance about this," he told reporters late on

Sunday. Jamiat in a statement yeslamiat in a statement yes-terday said his removal was "unjustified and yet another step toward increasing tension in the country". The dispute comes at a bad time for Ghani's US-backed government, which is facing growing public fury over recent deadly attacks in Kabul and elsewhere in the war-torn

country that have lath bare its inability to protect civilians.

Ghani, who belongs to the country's largest Pashtun ethnic group, took the presidency in 2014 in a US-brokered powersharing deal with his rival, Jamiat-backed Abdullah Abdullah, who was named chief executive

Tourists trapped in Malaysia cable car accident

KUALA LUMPUR: Hundreds of tourists were stranded for hours after a cable car broke down on the Malaysian island of Langkawi, authorities said yesterday, with some left dangling in cabins over a jungle-clad mountain as night

Over 1.000 tourists and scores of cable car workers were trapped on Sunday when a faulty part caused the popular attraction to grind to a halt, officials said

Almost 90 people were travelling on the cable car --which is on the island's second-highest peak and offers panoramic views over the palm-fringed tourist hotspot -- at the time of the accident. The majority were at the top of Mount Machinchang, or at a station halfway down.

Duterte aide faces frigate deal probe

MANILA: Philippine senators began a public inquiry yesterday into the \$300m purchase of two navy frigates, to determine whether President Rodrigo Duterte's closest aide had inter-

whether President Rodrigo Duterie's closest aide had inter-fered in the procurement process.

The inquiry was prompted by media reports that carried a leaked document with an annotation that links the president's longtime special assistant, Christopher "Bong" Go, to the process of procuring a combat management system for the frigates

of procuring a compai management system for the frigates from a South Korea's Hyundial Heavy Industries.

The hearing called by the Senate committee on national defence and security is looking to establish whether or not Go had gone beyond his remit by getting involved in a defence contract. He has not been accused of corruption.

Go denies any wrongdoing and read a statement critical of the media, calling it "fake news". He said he was simply passing on to the defence department a "complaint" the Office of the President had received.

Indonesia steps up effort to curb online content

JAKARTA: Indonesia has blocked more than 70,000 websites displaying "negative" content such as pornography or extremist ideology in the first month of using a new system to help purge the internet of harmful material, the communications minister said.

The world's most populous Muslim-majority country has stepped up efforts to control online content after a rise in hoax stories and hate speech, and amid controversial anti-por nography laws pushed by Islamic parties. The so-called "crawling system" developed by a unit of



state-run Telekomunikasi Indo nesia Tbk (Telkom) was launched in January, using 44 servers to search Internet con-tent and issue alerts when inap-propriate material is found.

"We just put some sort of key words there, most of them are pornographic," said Minister of Communication and Informa-tion Rudiantara (pictured), who uses one name.

"Because after 2017 we have blocked almost 800,000 sites and more than 90 percent (of these were) pornographic," said the minister.

According to ministry data, the system, installed at a cost of around \$15m, helped block 72,407 pornography sites in

The ministry also acts to get content removed from social media platforms if there are complaints from the public. Indonesia threatened last

year to block Facebook Inc's WhatsApp Messenger, which is widely used in the country, unless obscene Graphics Inter-change Format (GIF) images provided by third parties were removed. Authorities also blocked

access to some channels on encrypted messaging service Tel-egram last year, saying it had several forums that were "full of rad-

eral forums that were "full of rad-ical and terrorist propaganda". The minister also said that nine tech companies, including Google and Facebook, had recently pledged to help authorities fight fake news and hate speech during upcoming elec-tions in the world's third-biggest democracy.

Indonesian volcano erupts, spews ash

KARO: An Indonesian volcano erupted yesterday, sending a massive column of ash and smoke some 5,000 metres into the air, leaving local villages coated in debris and officials scrambling to hand out face masks to residents.

Mount Sinabung on Sumatra island, which has been rumbling since 2010 and saw a deadly eruption in 2016, spewed the thick plume after activity picked up recent days.

"This was the biggest erup-

tion for Sinabung this year," said volcanology agency chief Kas-ban, who like many Indonesians goes by one name

There were no reports of injuries or deaths.

No one lives inside a previ-ously announced no-go zone around the volcano.

But hundreds of houses outside the seven-kilometre danger zone were covered in volcanic ash.

Officials have distributed face masks and urged local residents to stay indoors to avoid respiratory problems, said local disaster mitigation agency offi-

disaster mitigation agency offi-cial Nata Nail Perangin-angin. "In some villages the visi-bility was barely five metres after the eruption -- it was pitch black," Perangin-angin added.

"Pressure inside the crater was threatening to spark col-lapses in its dome," the official

Sinabung roared back to life in 2010 for the first time in 400 years. After another period of inactivity it erupted once more in 2013, and has remained highly

active since. In 2016, seven people died in one of Sinabung's eruptions, while a 2014 eruption left 16 people dead.

Indonesia is home to around Indonesia is home to around 130 volcanoes due to its position on the "Ring of Fire", a belt of tectonic plate boundaries cir-cling the Pacific Ocean where frequent seismic activity occurs.

Cambodia found nest of endangered 'royal turtles'

PHNOM PENH: Wildlife experts in discovered a nest with 16 eggs discovered a nest with 16 eggs built by the nearly extinct "royal turtle", in the first such discovery this year, the non-profit Wildlife Conservation (WCS) Society said yesterday.

The southern river terrapin known in Cambodia as the "royal turtle" because its eggs were historically reserved for royalty, is one of the world's 25 most endangered freshwater

Over the past two years, just three such nests have been found in Cambodia, it added.

"Illegal clearance of flooded forest and illegal fishing puts this species at risk," said Som Sitha, a technical adviser to the WCS.

"Everyone can help con-serve our national reptile by not purchasing or eating their meat

and eggs."
Wildlife rangers in the southwestern province of Koh Kong, where the eggs were dis-covered along a river by villagers and conservationists, including the WCS, are guarding them until they hatch, the con-

servation group said in a statement.

Populations of Batagur Populations of Batagur affinis, as the species is known to zoologists, are "severely depleted", it added, as it is hunted for its flesh and large eggs, and faced with habitat destructions. destruction.

The turtle was believed extinct in Cambodia until 2000, when a small popula-tion was rediscovered by conservationists.

US indictment lacks evidence: Kremlin

MOSCOW: The Kremlin said yesterday that US charges against 13 Russians and several Russian companies accused of meddling in the 2016 US presi-dential election campaign contained zero proof of Russian state involvement

The comments were the Kremlin's first reaction to charges drawn up by the office of US Special Counsel Robert Mueller which centred on a Russian businessman nicknamed Putin's cook' by the Russian media who US officials say has extensive ties to the country's military and political

The full indictment, released on Friday, said that a Russian propaganda arm funded by the businessman, Evgeny Prigozhin, oversaw a criminal and espionage conspiracy to tamper in the 2016 U.S presidential campaign to support Donald Trump and disparage Hillary Clinton. The charges are awkward for the Kremlin which is keen

to try to build a relationship with Trump in the hope that could eventually lead to U. sanctions imposed over its role in Ukraine being lifted

The election-meddling alle gations have soured US-Russia Kremlin spokesman **Dmitry Peskoy said** that the US indictment centred purely on individuals and presented no tangible proof that the Kremlin itself or Russian government agencies were involved.

UK reviews high tuition fees

LONDON: British universities must offer students value for money, Prime Minister Theresa May said yesterday, launching a review that could reduce fees a review that could reduce fees and restore grants in a bid to entice younger voters who helped punish her party at an election last year. In a speech designed to

show her programme for Britain is more than just its departure from the European Union, May said she wanted not only to look at the funding of education but also at ways of raising the importance of technical studies

to prepare the country for life

after Brexit in the high-tech age. Her pitch was also aimed at the opposition Labour Party, which, some pollsters say, won which, some pointers say, won over young voters by promising to get rid of student fees and which threaten to force the Con-servatives out of several London councils in local elections in May.

"We now have one of the most expensive systems of university tuition in the world," she said at a college in the northern English city of Derby, adding that she shared the concerns of students and their carers.

"The review will now look at the whole question of how students and graduates contribute to the cost of their studies," she said, dodging a question whether taxpayers would have to pay more towards the university education of students.

Labour's education policy adviser, Angela Rayner, described the speech as an admission by May "that her government got it wrong"

"This long-winded review is an unnecessary waste of time. Labour will abolish tuition fees, bring back maintenance grants and provide free, lifelong education in Further Education colleges."

Merkel taps close ally for CDU party head

BERLIN: German Chancellor Angela Merkel put forward close ally Annegret Kramp-Karren-bauer yesterday to take over as secretary-general of her Christian Democrats (CDU), heeding calls from within the party to inject new blood and groom a successor.

The decision to entrust

Kramp-Karrenbauer with bol-Kramp-Karrenbauer with bol-stering the CDU after it lost ground in last year's election is significant as some party mem-bers are starting to look ahead to a post-Merkel era.

Merkel, who was CDU secretary-general before becoming chancellor, said

a long time and can rely on each other, even if we have our own views," Merkel, 63, told a joint news conference with Kramp Karrenbauer, 55. Asked if she saw Kramp

Karrenbauer as a possible suc-cessor, Merkel replied: "It is your privilege that you are always three laps ahead of others ... We ir hands full managing e business of the day.

French violinist Didier Lockwood dies at 62

PARIS: Noted French jazz violinist Didier Lockwood, a disciple of the late Stephane Grappelli, has died of a heart

Grappelli, has died of a heart attack in Parts, his agent said.
Lockwood, who turned 62 on February 11, died on Sunday. The night before his death, he had performed at Paris jazz venue Bal Blomet.
"His wife, his three daydiers, his family, his agent, his co-workers and his record label are sad to announce the sudden passing

announce the sudden passing of Didier Lockwood," his agent said in a statement. Lockwood was playing at a jazz festival when he met

Grappelli, another French jazz great who founded a

jazz great who founded a string quintet the Hot Club of France in 1934. The violinist invited the then 20-year-old Lockwood to join him on a European tour, kicking off an interna-tional career in which he gave around 4,500 concerts and released more than 35 records.

"That was the start of my "Inat was the start of my career, the launchpad that got me into the world of popular jazz," Lockwood told Radio France in 2008. Lockwood was com-

mitted to music education, in 2001 setting up the Didier Lockwood Music Centre in a town south of Paris teaching improvisation.

French culture minister Francoise Nyssen described Lockwood as "deeply gen-erous and outgoing" and said he would be missed by "his friends, music and all the children he wished to enlighten with his passion'

France urges UN court to dump E Guinea case

THE HAGUE: France accused Equatorial Guinea yesterday of Equatorial duinea yesterday of wanting to "paralyse" French criminal procedure in a top-level corruption probe, as it urged judges to throw out a case against it before the UN's

Malabo has dragged Paris before the International Court of Justice in a bitter diplomatic row, accusing it of violating the diplomatic immunity of its vice president Teodorin Obiang.

Son of Teodoro Obiang, long-time leader of the oil-rich central African country, Teodorin Obiang has been prose cuted by a French court on charges of embezzling \$180m of public funds to finance his jet-set lifestyle. France's representatives however hit back as a hearing

opened before the Hague-based ICJ, with delegation member Alain Pellet saying Equatorial Guinea attempted to "slow down, or even paralyse the criminal procedure launched in France." Malabo's decision to take the matter to the ICJ is an attempt "to give their case more prominence" argued Pellet, who said Paris chal-

lenged the ICJ's jurisdiction.

"France has not accepted the jurisdiction of this court under any title whatsoever to entertain those facts on which Equatorial Guinea seeks the court to rule," French repre-sentative Francois Alabrune added.

Obiang, 48, was tried in absentia and sentenced in October to a three-year susrended sentence corruption.

The top official from the small central African state was also given a suspended fine of \$35m for money laundering, corruption and abuse. His lawyer has said he will appeal

But Equatorial Guinea has also lodged a complaint with the ICJ in The Hague, the UN's top court set up to resolve disputes between countries.

Four days of hearings opened yesterday, with France setting out its reasons why it believed the ICJ is not competent to hear the case.

Paris has challenged the ICJ's jurisdiction in the case since it first opened, citing the UN's Convention against Tran-snational Organised Crime.

police custody.

Another American was arrested in Serbia earlier this

month for possession of an unmarked gun. Pro-government media alleged that he was a former Navy SEAL and had planned the assassination of unidentified Serbian officials. Serbian President

Aleksandar Vucic mentioned the arrest of a "group" of foreigners, but added that their case is 'nothing especially serious

The arrest took place amid a mounting anti-Western media campaign in Serbia and increasing Russian influence.

Trump, who is spending the weekend at his private Palm Beach estate, started President's Day at his nearby golf club. The White House did not immediately answer questions about whether he was playing golf. The president spent most of the weekend at Mar-a-Lago, as White House aides advised against golfing too soon after the against goining to soon after the shooting at a Parkland high school that left 17 dead. Trump spent much of the holiday weekend watching

cable television news and grousing to club members and advisers about the investigation

of Russian election meddling.

In a marathon series of furious weekend tweets from Mar-a-Lago, Trump vented about Russia, raging at the FBI for what he perceived to be a fixation on the Russia investi-gation at the cost of failing to deter the attack on a Florida

Southwest of the state capital, Oaxaca city. It appeared to be an after-shock of a magnitude 7.2 earthquake that struck near the same

area on Friday.

That quake caused no deaths, though 13 people were killed in the crash of a helicopter sent to assess the damage.

Fire destroys 5 ambulances, causes \$2m damages

WOODSTOWN, NEW IERSEY: Authorities say a fast-moving fire gutted an ambulance squad's building in New Jersey, destroying five ambu-lances and causing at least \$2m in damage overall.

The fire at the American Legion Ambulance Association, in Woodstown, broke out around 4am yesterday and was extinguished about two hours later. Officials say oxygen tanks inside some of the squad's ambulances exploded shortly after the fire began, helping the flames to quickly

Four squad members who were on duty at the time were inside the building when the fire erupted but were able to safely escape. Authorities say one of the workers smelled smoke and soon discovered the fire, then alerted co-workers to leave the

building.

Trump revives push for limits on immigrants bringing family

NEW YORK: When the US government approved Ricardo Magpantay, his wife and young children to immigrate to America from the Philippines, it was 1991. By the time a visa was available. it was 2005, and his children couldn't come with him because they were now adults. More than a decade later, his

children are still waiting.

Magpantay gets worried when he hears the White House is aiming to limit the relatives that immigrants-turned-citizens can sponsor, a profound change to a fundamental piece of the American immigration

'It is really frustrating and it is very dreadful for me, because after a long wait, if this will be passed, what will happen for them?" said Magpantay, a 68-year-old mechanical engi-neer in the Southern California city of Murrieta. "I won't be able

to bring them forever."

For the past 50-plus years, family reunification has been central to US immigration law. Those who become naturalized citizens can bring spouses and minor childen and petition for parents, adult children and siblings to get their own green cards and become Americans in their own right, with their own ability to sponsor.

Many on opposing sides of the immigration debate have long felt the family reunification system needs reform. Immigra-tion advocates want a reassessment of the quotas on how many

country in a given year, which has created decadeslong back-logs for citizens of some

Self-described "restriction-Self-described "restriction-ists," including President Donald Trump, want a narrower, nuclear definition of family, making spouses and minor children the only relatives a citizen could

That's a central plank of the sweeping immigration overhaul Trump has proposed, a move that activists say could cut legal immigration in the US by half

Congress rejected competing bills last week meant to resolve the status of hundreds of thou-sands of young people brought to the US illegally, including one plan

that mirrored Trump's overall immigration proposal. The lack of resolution on an issue that was pivotal to Trump's election leaves it as potential tinderbox for the midterm congressional elections this fall

In his State of the Union speech last month, Trump ref-erenced an attempted bombing by a Bangladeshi immigrant in New York in December as proof of the need to curtail what he and others term "chain migra-tion" in favor of a more skills-

Guards retake control after Brazilian prison riot

RIO DE JANEIRO: The last of 18 hostages seized in a prison riot near Rio de Janeiro have been freed and guards have retaken control of the facility, officials said.

The uprising in the over-crowded prison began Sunday and was quelled after a few hours, the state penitentiary administration said in a state ment late Sunday.

ment late Sunday.

Eight guards and 10 inmates had been held hostage.

Three prisoners were injured during the incident, the statement said.

According to authorities the riot began "when security inspectors and administrators from the penitentiary prevented an escape attempt by inmates.

Most Brazilian prisons are seriously overcrowded and plagued by gang violence. In one of the bloodiest episodes, 56 people were killed in an uprising at a prison in the Amazon city of Manaus early

The Rio prison unrest came two days after President Michel Temer signed a decree putting the army in charge of security across the state, where crime is spinning out of control and one policeman is killed on average every three days.

Brazil's lower house of Congress was expected to vote on the decree late Monday, with the Senate due to consider the measure afterwards.

Inmate in landmark Supreme Court case denied parole

NEW YORK: A 71-year-old Louisiana inmate whose case Louisiana inmate whose case led to a landmark US Supreme Court decision on juvenile-offender sentences was denied parole on Monday, more than a half-century after he killed a sheriff's deputy at age 17.

A three-member panel from the state parole board

voted 2 to 1 to keep Henry Montgomery imprisoned. The hearing was his first chance at freedom since his conviction decades ago.

Cuban Hospital sees sharp rise in patient visits

DOHA: The Cuban Hospital has seen a sharp rise in the patient visits over the past five years. The hospital recorded 74,331 outpa-tient visits and 4,536 inpatients in 2017, compared to 256 inpatients and 17,345 outpatients it

registered in 2012.

The number of surgeries performed at the hospital increased from 259 in 2012 to 3,100 in 2017. It also recorded 677 births in 2017 a major jump from nine births in 2012, according to senior officials at the Cuban Hospital.

"Cuban Hospital provides all medical and surgical services in more than 25 specialties. We aim at providing improved

services and reducing the waiting list for patients. Mainly the hospital receives patients from the western part of the country as well as some from Doha," said Dr Angel Mario Felpe Garmendia, Medical Director of the Cuban Hospital, speaking to media recently

speaking to media recently.

Located in Dukhan, The
Cuban Hospital was officially
opened in January 2012, as a
joint project between the government of Qatar and Cuba. It
functions in collaboration with functions in collaboration with tunctions in collaboration with the Hamad Medical Corporation (HMC) and has around 450 Cuban staff including doctors, nurses and technical staff. The hospital has 75 beds and seven

operating theatres.

"We are working on to expand our services and open

more evening clinics, laser eye surgeries and dental in plant services this year. Also a bone services this year. Also a bone and joint centre will open aiming at providing comprehen-sive orthopaedic services including surgeries and a full cycle of rehabilitation," said Dr Garmendia.

The Cuban Hospital mainly serves people in Dukhan which has about 5,000 staff of Qatar Petroleum and Zekreet which has about 7,000 labour camps, Shahaniya, the biggest city close

Snananiya, the biggest city close to Dukhan and Umm Bab a nearby small town. "We also receive many patients from Doha seeking services in all specialties. About 35 percent of all patients are coming from Doha and are referred from by HMC
